DEDICATION

This year The Chester Fair lost three members of our family.
We dedicate the 2011 Fairbook in their honor.

John R. Kurze, Jr., formerly of Deep River, CT, was a graduate of Valley Regional High School and the Missouri Auction School. He was an auctioneer for the Middlesex Livestock Auction and the James Tate Auction Gallery. As an entertaining auctioneer, John often volunteered to raise money for local churches, fire departments, and other charities and organizations. In 2006 he received the Connecticut 4H Alumni Award.



John was a dedicated director and volunteer at the Chester Fair for many years. He was the Superintendent of the Livestock Pulls and was a fan favorite in his trademark cowboy hat and signature smile. He is also remembered for his well-known talent as a professionally trained auctioneer at the Chester Fair's Annual Scholarship Auction Event on the main stage. John was always looking for ways to improve the fair with new ideas. He supported the Children's Pedal Tractor Pull and sponsored the Frog Jump Contest, both of which continue to be popular with children and adults alike. John was made an Honorary Director when he moved to Florida, but left a lasting legacy in Chester.

Ken Kells of Ivoryton, CT, was a civil engineer and Vice President of Design



and Construction with the CT Water Company for many years until his retirement in 2001. During the next eight years he owned his own consulting business. Ken was an active volunteer in his community and had been a chair of the Ivoryton Library Board, a member of the Essex Board of Selectman, and Board of Finance, as well as the Connecticut River Gateway Commission. Ken and his wife Judy were the Grand Marshalls of the July 4th Ivoryton parade last year. Ivoryton Resident and Parade Organizer, Susie Beckman was quoted by reporter Rita Christoper in the July 1, 2010 edition of the Valley

Courier: "He's given so much to the community from the Little League to the Ivoryton Library. He's been elected to town commissions, served in volunteer positions, and he's done it all quietly."

DEDICATION

Ken was involved in many aspects of the Chester Fair and served as the chair of the Financial/Legal Committee as well as a member of the board of directors. He was always willing to lend a hand and his expertise to all aspects of the fair. He will be remembered fondly as a wandering photographer who helped chronicle each year's events as well as a gifted, thoughtful advisor.

Daniel Zanardi, life long resident of Chester, CT, was the former owner of A.A. Zanardi Co. Inc. a family business begun by his father and owned and operated today by his sons. Dan was an army veteran who proudly served in the U.S. Army from 1942-1945. For eleven years, Dan served as Chester's 2nd Selectman. He was formerly the president of the Rotary Club and board member of Chester Bank and Trust.



Dan's neighbor, good friend and former Chester Fair Director, Carmine Grote asked him many years ago to join the Chester Fair Association. Dan and his siblings had grown up tending their grandparents' and parents' huge vegetable gardens, as well as caring for beef and dairy cows and many other farm animals. Dan believed that volunteering at the Chester Fair was a wonderful way to be involved in his town's annual event. He was always willing to lend his expertise in livestock and agricultural aspects of the fair. His family recounted how much he valued the time he spent volunteering and the numerous friends he made during those years. He especially enjoyed taking his three boys, Dean, David and Danny to see the horses, cows, oxen pulls and to eat lots of hot dogs and ride the rides. Dan remained involved in the fair for 20 years and The Chester Fair Board was proud to have him as an Honorary Director.

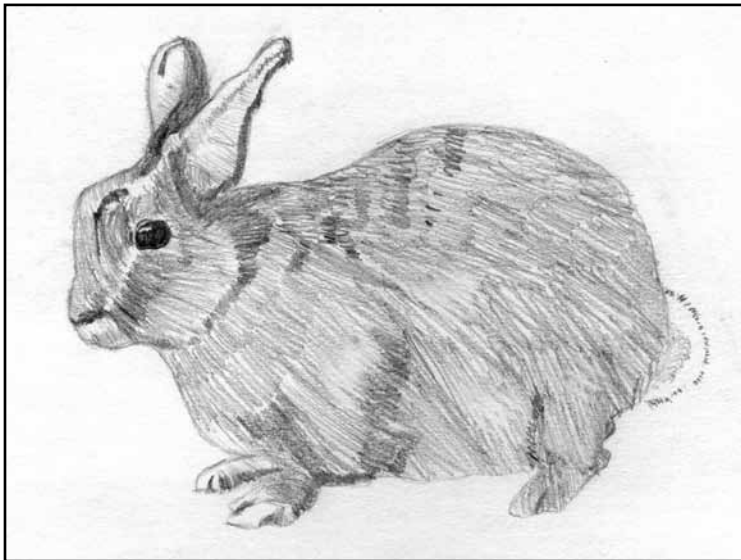

2011 STATE BAKING CONTESTS

Sponsored by the Association of Connecticut Fairs, Inc.

RULES OF THE CONTEST

WHO MAY ENTER: The Contest at each participating member fair is open to all men, women and juniors who are residents of Connecticut. Commercial, industrial or professional bakers are not eligible to enter.

Divisions: Juniors (ages 9 to 15 as of July 1st) Senior (age 15 and over).

HOW TO ENTER: Any Connecticut resident entering a contest at any member fair is automatically entered and competing in the local contest. Contestants may enter the contest at as many fairs as they wish until they win first prize. They will then represent that fair at the state baking contest. Please submit entries to both the local and state contest on disposable plates. The Association of Connecticut Fairs and the local fairs are not responsible for the return of plates, trays or containers.

JUDGING: Judging will be based on appearance, flavor and texture. The Association of Connecticut Fairs will furnish judges' score sheets to each fair and the contestant will receive these sheets at the end of the contest. Additions, deletions or substitutions in the recipe are not permitted and will result in disqualification. All decisions of the judges are final.

LOCAL CONTEST: The winner of the Baking Contest will receive a blue ribbon from the Association of Connecticut Fairs and will then become eligible to submit their entry at the state contest. In the event that only one entry is received at the local contest and that entry is worthy of first prize, that entry must be awarded the first place ribbon.

ADULT CONTEST RECIPE

Rustic Cheese & Rosemary Bread

Ingredients:

3 3/4 to 4 cups bread flour	1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon granulated sugar	1 1/4 cups, approximately 5 oz. shredded Asiago cheese (not grated), separated
1 package dry yeast, instant, 2 1/4 teaspoons	1/4 cup, approximately 1 oz., shredded Parmigianino cheese (not grated)
1 1/4 cups warm water, 120 to 125 degrees	Cooking spray
2 Tablespoons extra virgin olive oil	
1 Tablespoon fresh rosemary chopped	

Directions:

1. In a large mixing bowl, combine 1 3/4 cups of the flour, 1 teaspoon sugar, yeast package and stir until well mixed.
2. Add the warm water to the flour mixture slowly while beating with an electric mixer on low speed for 1 minute, stopping frequently to scrape batter from side and bottom of bowl. Cover bowl tightly with plastic wrap; let stand about 1 hour in a warm draft free area.
3. In a small cup, combine olive oil, rosemary and salt. Stir olive mixture into above flour mixture. Stir in or use an electric stand mixer with a dough hook enough of the remaining flour, 1/2 cup at a time, until dough is soft, leaves side of bowl and is not sticky. Cover tightly with plastic wrap; let rest for 15 minutes.
4. Place dough onto a floured surface and knead for 8 minutes, sprinkling surface with more flour if dough starts to stick, until dough is smooth and springy. Dough should not be wet or sticky.
5. Combine 1 cup Asiago and 1/4 cup Parmigianino cheese and knead cheeses into the dough for 3 minutes or until fully incorporated. Spray a large bowl with the cooking spray. Place dough in bowl, turning dough to grease all sides. Cover bowl tightly with plastic wrap; let rise in a warm area for 1 hour.
6. Lightly spray a cookie sheet with the cooking spray. Gently push your fist into the dough to deflate it. Place dough on floured surface and gently shape into football-shaped loaf, about 12 inches long. Place loaf on the cookie sheet. Coat loaf with flour to prevent sticking. Cover loosely with plastic wrap; let rise in a warm place 45 to 60 minutes or until loaf has almost doubled in size.
7. Move oven racks to lowest and middle positions. Place an 8-inch square pan on the bottom oven rack; add hot water to the pan until almost full. Heat the oven to 450°F.
8. Pour a small amount of cool water into a clean spray bottle. Spray the loaf lightly with water; sprinkle with a small amount of flour. Dip a sharp thin knife into cool water and carefully cut a 1/2-inch-deep slash lengthwise down the center of the loaf. Sprinkle the remaining 1/4 cup of Asiago cheese in the slash.
9. Place loaf and cookie sheet in the oven and give the oven a few spritzes of cool water, away from the light bulb, before closing the door. Bake 10 minutes.
10. Reduce the oven temperature to 400°F. Bake 20 to 25 minutes longer or until loaf is deep golden and sounds hollow when tapped. Remove from cookie sheet to a cooling rack and cool for 30 minutes.
11. Submit the whole loaf (do not cut) on a plate or covered cardboard not to exceed 1" in size around each side of bread.

JUNIOR CONTEST RECIPE

Cookies and Cream Brownies

1 8 oz. package 1/3 less fat cream cheese, at room temperature	1/2 cup butter
1 cup + 1 & 1/4 Tbs sugar	6 oz unsweetened chocolate, chopped
1 & 1/4 cups liquid egg substitute such as Egg Beaters	1 package, (5 oz.) Pured prune baby food
1 teaspoon vanilla extract	1 cup all-purpose flour
8 reduced-fat chocolate Oreo cookies, chopped	1 teaspoon baking powder
	1/4 teaspoon salt

PREHEAT oven to 350 degrees.

LINE a 9 inch baking pan with enough foil to overhang sides by 2 inches; coat with cooking spray.

On medium-high speed, beat cream cheese and 2 tablespoons sugar until light and fluffy, 1-2 minutes.

Beat in 1/4 cup egg substitute and vanilla.

Stir in cookies; reserve.

In pot, melt butter and chocolate over medium heat.

Remove from heat; stir in remaining 1 cup sugar until blended, then remaining egg substitute and baby food.

Stir in flour, baking powder and salt until combined.

Spread 1/2 of chocolate layer in pan. Drop 1/2 of cream cheese batter by tablespoon fulls over chocolate.

Repeat with remaining batters.

Bake 50-55 minutes or until toothpick inserted comes out with moist crumbs.

Cool 20 minutes.

Using foil, lift brownie from pan, cool completely on rack.

Cut into squares, submit 8 squares for judging, enjoy the rest.

HOW TO ENTER: Any resident of Connecticut entering the Apple Pie Contest at any fair belonging to the Association of Connecticut Fairs is automatically competing in the local contest. Contestants may enter the contest in as many fairs as they wish UNTIL THEY WIN FIRST PRIZE. They then will represent that fair in the state contest. Contestants will be subject to entry rules at the local fairs.

JUDGING CRITERIA:

Overall Appearance	40	Crust	10
Flavor	40	Texture	10

RULES:

1. Each pie must be a 9" (measured at the top inside edge of the dish) Two Crusted Pie.
2. Submit a 3 x 5 card with recipe, your name and address printed legibly
3. No pre-made or mix will be allowed
4. Main ingredient must be apples. However, pies may include other fruits or ingredients.
5. Pies become the property of the Association of Connecticut Fairs (baking dishes will not be returned).

The Association of Connecticut Fairs will furnish score sheets to each fair and the contestant will receive these sheets at the end of the event. All decisions of the judges will be final.

LOCAL CONTEST: The winner of the contest will receive a blue ribbon from the Association of Connecticut Fairs at each fair and will be eligible to submit their entry at the Annual meeting of The Association. In the event a fair receives only one entry to the contest and that entry is worthy of the first prize, the Association ribbon must be awarded to the contestant.

Note: Health charts from the Commissioner of Agriculture required for all cattle entries.

Recommendations of Committee on Fairs as adopted by the Connecticut Purebred Dairy Cattle Association:

1. All cattle must have a health certificate issued within 60 days of their first show from an accredited veterinarian stating that the animal is in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases. All exhibitors must send a copy of health chart to superintendent with entries. Copy will be returned after show.
2. All entries must originate from herds that meet the testing and health requirements of the State of Connecticut. State livestock inspectors may request proof of compliance with state requirements.
3. All animals must have permanent identification. (Tattoo, ear tag, or microchip plus a reader.)
4. **ALL ANIMALS MUST HAVE RABIES VACCINATION AT LEAST 30 DAYS BEFORE FAIR.**
5. **Out of state cattle:** All cattle over 3 months of age must have a negative TB test within 12 months prior to show date. Cattle under 3 months of age may go on the dam's TB test chart if the dam was tested for TB within the past 12 months and a copy of the results provided. All brucellosis vaccinated female cattle over 18 months of age and all bulls and non-vaccinated female cattle 6 months of age and older shall have a negative Brucellosis test within 12 months prior to their first show date. Steers and spayed heifers are exempt from brucella testing. Animals must be accompanied by a health certificate and test charts approved by the appropriate animal health official in the state of origin.
6. Registration or lease papers will be required for **all** animals except crossbred beef.
7. A **minimum** amount of bedding will be provided.

9. An entry fee of \$2.00 per animal to be mailed with entry.
10. Livestock exhibitors planning to use the wash rack must provide their own hose with a shutoff nozzle.
11. No campers on the grounds.

13. There will be a limit of two entries per class.

5. No contrivance to be used for cattle other than conventional yoke.
6. Only contestants and officials allowed in ring.
7. Not more than 3 men per horse and pony team. Not more than 2 men per oxen team.
8. All contestants in drawing contest must be weighed on day of drawing on scales at the fair grounds. Scales open both days at 8 a.m. Check weighing for horses from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m.
9. Unless otherwise specified all drawing contests will be in accordance with Eastern Draft Horse Association, Connecticut Draft Pony Association, and CT Ox Owners Association Rules and Regulations.
10. In accordance with Connecticut P.A. 73-312, all equine animals are required to be vaccinated for the control of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis and rabies. Horses are recommended to be vaccinated for EEE within 6 months of first show date.
11. **All horses must have a negative (AGID) Coggins test or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia within 12 months prior to show date, and be accompanied by such certificate.**
12. In the event that a class is not held, the Superintendent has the right to distribute premiums at his/her discretion.
13. **TYING ANIMALS TO THE FENCE IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED.**
14. **NO FACE LASHING OF DRAWING CATTLE.**

King Arthur Flour Carrot Cake

One 9 x 13-inch cake, or one three-layered 8-inch cake.

Carrot cake is a touchstone dessert. We know lots of folks for whom nothing else will do on their birthdays. But if someone asks you for a carrot cake, make sure to ask which kind they're thinking about, since there are really two distinct styles. One camp garnishes with raisins and nuts, while the other heads for crushed pineapple and/or coconut; the recipe below will work perfectly well either way. Or, if you're the sort for whom too much is just enough, put all of them in.

This is a good-sized recipe; it will generously fill a 9 x 13-inch pan or three 8-inch round pans, if you want to make it as a layer cake. It's moist and flavorful enough to stand on its own with just a dusting of confectioners' sugar, but we know of no better way to enjoy cream cheese frosting than with carrot cake!

4 large eggs	1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 1/2 cups (10 1/2 ounces) vegetable oil	1 teaspoon nutmeg
2 teaspoons vanilla extract	2 1/2 cups (8 3/4 ounces) finely grated carrots
1 3/4 cups (12 1/4 ounces) sugar	1 cup (4 ounces) chopped pecans or walnuts
2 cups (8 1/2 ounces) unbleached all-purpose flour	1 cup (3 ounces) shredded or flaked coconut*
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder	1 can (8 ounces) crushed pineapple, drained*
2 teaspoons baking soda	
1 teaspoon salt	

Preheat the oven to 350°F.

In a large mixing bowl, beat the eggs and add oil while mixer is running. Add vanilla, then gradually add the sugar. You'll have a thick, foamy, lemon-colored mixture. In a separate medium-sized bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt and spices. Add these dry ingredients to the wet mixture, stirring to make a smooth batter. Add the carrots and nuts, then additional garnishes of your choice (coconut, pineapple, and/or raisins).

Pour the batter into a greased 9 x 13-inch sheet pan or three 8-inch round pans and bake for 45 to 50 minutes (sheet) or 35 minutes (rounds). Cake is done when tester inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool in the pan 10 minutes, then turn out to cool completely. Dust with confectioners' sugar or frost with cream cheese frosting, or the icing of your choice.

*Or substitute 2 cups (12 ounces) raisins for the coconut and pineapple.

Junior Contest Bakery Date Squares



Date squared, fig squares, raspberry squares - two layers of crumbly, crunchy, sweet oatmeal crust sandwiching a gooey layer of filling.

Yield: 36 squares | Baking temperature: 350°F | Baking time: 30 minutes

Filling*

3 cups (15 to 16 ounces) chopped dates

1 cup (8 ounces) water

Heaping 1/4 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon lemon juice

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Crust

1 1/2 cups (5 1/4 ounces) rolled oats

1 1/2 cups (6 1/4 ounces) unbleached all-purpose flour (or a half-and-half combination of all-purpose and whole wheat flours)

1 cup (8 ounces) brown sugar

3/4 teaspoon baking soda

3/4 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks, 6 ounces) unsalted butter, melted

1/2 cup (2 ounces) chopped walnuts or pecans

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Lightly grease a 9 x 9-inch or 7 x 11-inch pan.

To make the filling: In a small saucepan, combine the dates, water, salt, and lemon juice. Bring the mixture to a boil, reduce the heat to low, and simmer for 3 to 4 minutes, or until the water is absorbed and mixture has thickened somewhat. Remove the pan from the heat, stir in the vanilla, and set aside to cool while you prepare the crust. If the mixture is too chunky for your taste, puree some or all of it.

To make the crust: In a medium-sized bowl, whisk together the oats, flour, brown sugar, baking soda, and salt. Add the melted butter, stirring until everything is well combined.

To assemble the bars: Press 2 1/2 cups of the crust mixture into the prepared pan, smoothing it out to completely cover the bottom of the pan, with no gaps showing. Spread the filling on the crust. Add the walnuts to the remaining crust mixture and sprinkle it over the filling.

Bake the squares for 30 minutes, or until the crust is golden brown. Remove from the oven and let cool before cutting into 1 1/2-inch squares.

*For faster preparation, you can use your favorite jam or preserves as filling.

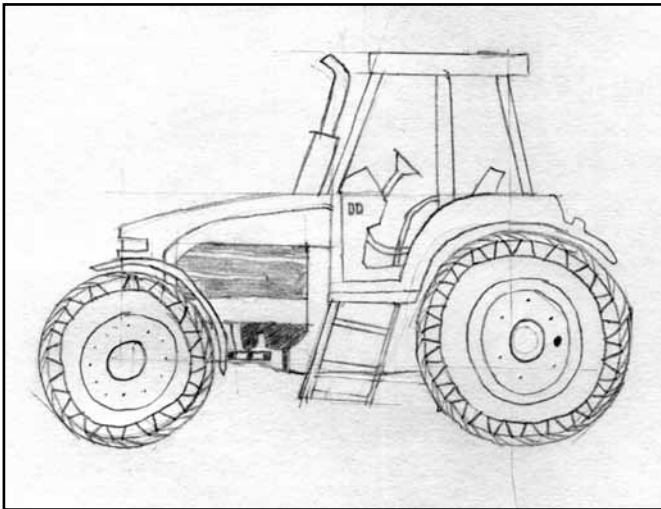

No entries will be accepted Saturday morning. All entries must be listed on the entry blanks furnished by the Society. Entries coming by mail must be in the Superintendent's hands before 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday before the fair. Early entries help to avoid the last minute rush.
3. ALL LIVESTOCK ENTRIES MUST BE MAILED TO CHESTER FAIR P.O. BOX 646 CHESTER, CT 06412 POSTMARKED AFTER JULY 15TH, 2010.
4. All animals, except Drawing Contests, must be within the Fair Grounds by 9:00 p.m. Friday. Classes E, F, G, H, I, J, K L, N and O will be accepted at the fair grounds 6:00 p.m. Thursday, August 25th and not before.
5. All Articles and Animals must be owned by the exhibitor. When there is no competition the withholding of premiums will be at the discretion of the Judges.
6. All Animals and Poultry entered for competition must have been owned by the person entering them on or before August 1, 2011. ALL SPECIES: Animals shall originate from herds or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements of the state of Connecticut. State livestock inspectors may request proof of compliance with state requirements. All animals and poultry must have permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo, leg band, wing band or microchip plus a reader). Recently imported animals must have met the health and testing requirements for entry into Connecticut. No herd or flock under quarantine order shall move or be exhibited.
7. All animals and poultry entered at fairs and shows must be in good health and in proper physical condition and will be examined at the exhibition by the barn superintendent. Evidence of poor condition or infectious or contagious disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in ejection. The Connecticut Department of Agriculture Livestock Inspector's decision is final.

9. Should any person enter an animal in any other name than that of its bona fide owner, the person making such an entry shall not be allowed a premium, should one be reported by the Judges.
